- Current member; recently retired
- Made significant and consistent contributions to SC/MLA or the profession

- Must be hospital librarians at the time of the award
- 5 years or more as a hospital librarian; at least 3 years of experience immediately preceding the award.

- Apply year-round – no deadline – as long as funds exist

First-time Attendee Scholarship

- Member of SCMLA, and not a student, attending their first SC/MLA meeting.
- Must attend a CE course and all SC/MLA sessions.

Jocelyn Rankin Memorial Scholarship

- Must be current, non-student Southern Chapter member who wants to attend a research-related continuing education course or workshop.

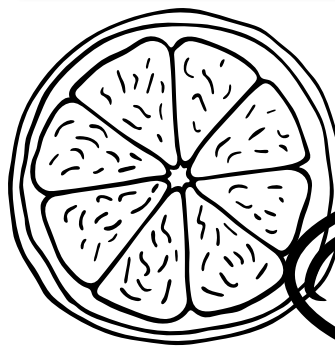
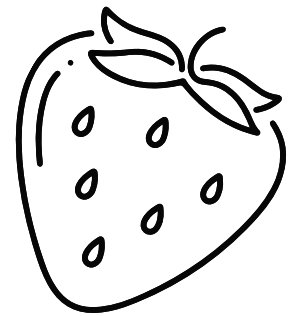

FSU upgrades DynaMed to DynaMedex with Isabel

The Maguire Medical Library has recently made the decision to upgrade our DynaMed subscription to DynaMedex with Isabel Pro. With ever-increasing demands by the curriculum to incorporate evidence-based information, we wanted a tool that could provide a wider breadth of reliable information on drugs, diseases, treatments, guidelines, and patient education, while also providing the value of a strong differential diagnostic tool. DynaMed has been part of the curriculum at FSU in both the MD and PA programs for a number of years, so this upgrade to DynaMedex adds robust pharmacological content from Micromedex while also serving the purpose of giving students a tool they can use from their first week in medical school to graduation as they progress from the basic sciences to clinical training. This also gives our clinical teaching faculty a trusted source to use to engage with our students and expect them to show evidence for the decisions they are making in preceptorships, clerkships, and sub-internships. We welcome any questions from our colleague libraries, if this is an upgrade you are considering.

Curriculum Support – The Rural Learning Experience (RuLE)

Each June, the medical library supports the College of Medicine’s Rural Learning Experience (RuLE). RuLE introduces students to rural communities – one of the pillars of the COM Mission – and to the essentials of performing a community health assessment.

Librarian support for RuLE has ranged from creating curricular materials and resources, to organizing and accompanying students on rural trips, to conducting train-the-trainer instruction on researching rural communities. The medical library has collaborated with RuLE faculty and instructors since the program began in 2010.

For June 2023, the medical library provided multiple levels of support for the RuLE sessions, which were greatly appreciated by the faculty course directors; and presumably, the students! Melodie Gardner, Information Services Librarian, was a facilitator for one of the four RuLE Debrief & Jigsaw Large Group sessions. Additionally, Susan Epstein, Systems Librarian was available to answer students’ questions as the subject expert “Librarian in a Box,” and the library also provided search tips and video tutorials for the students.

Maguire Medical Library Quick Tips

Search Tips for Online Health Information

Focus on the information you need: develop a research question

For example:

- Which cities and/or counties in Florida have the lowest education levels?
- Why or why not is food insecurity an issue in Jefferson County, Florida?

Search in databases (e.g., PubMed) or search engines (e.g., Google)

- **Databases** (many require subscriptions): Focus on specific topics and/or content
- **Search engines**: Broad coverage and numerous results; require quality control

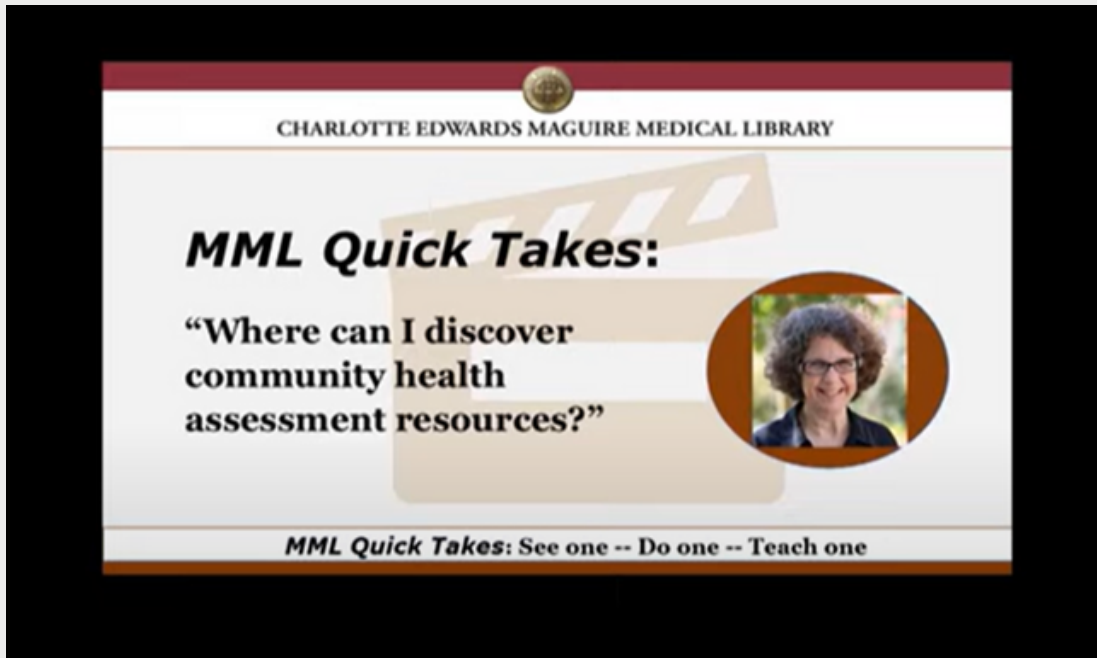
Refine your search strategies

- Put phrases in quotation marks: **“Jefferson County”**
- Add keywords to reduce ambiguity: **Florida** (many states have a Jefferson County!)
- Add **(2023 OR 2022 OR current)** to try to get the most up-to-date information
- Use search filters or limits to narrow your results

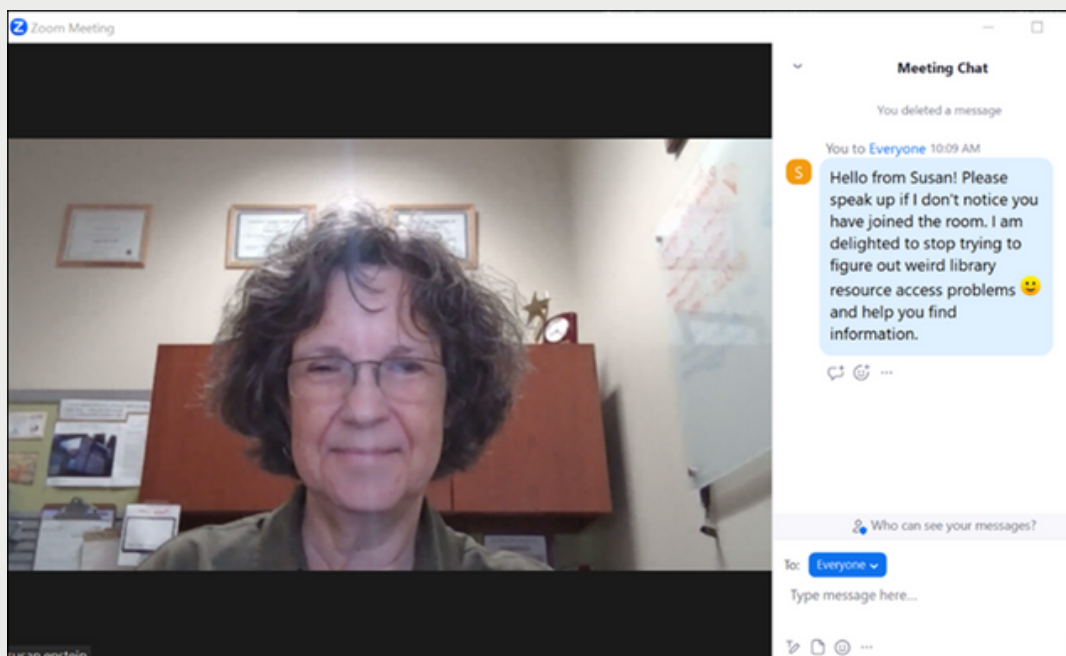

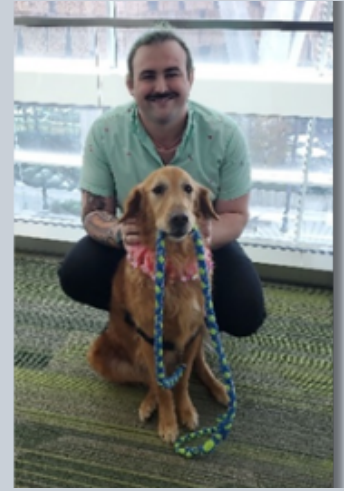
Pet Therapy & Snitch’s 14th Birthday

He helps family members of recently diagnosed children with intellectual and developmental disabilities and professionals who work in this field with nationwide access to quality health information.

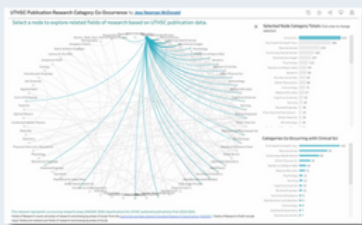


Tamara Nelson Elected to MLA Board of Directors
