NLM Traveling Exhibit and Related Events

The Charles M. Baugh Biomedical Library hosted the National Library of Medicine's traveling exhibit, "Life and Limb: The Toll of the American Civil War" from September 25 to November 4, 2023. The exhibit was on display in the lobby of the library with artifacts from the Mobile Medical Museum.

Panel Presentation and the Pickens Family Papers

Several events took place in association with the NLM exhibit, including a panel presentation by Dr. Henry McKiven, Associate Professor of History and Dr. Jess Mullens, Residency Program Director for Orthopedic Surgery at USA Health. Dr. McKiven's talk was based on information gleaned from the <u>Pickens Family Papers</u> curated by the Doyle Leale McCall Rare Books and Manuscripts Library at USA. Dr. Mullens' presentation covered amputation procedures and how they have evolved over time from the Civil War era to the present.

Online Book Discussion - Empty Sleeves: Amputation in the Civil War South

Another event was an online book discussion with Dr. Brian Miller, author of *Empty Sleeves: Amputation in the Civil War South.* In his highly original and deeply researched work, Miller explored the ramifications of amputation on the Confederacy, both during and after the Civil War. He explored how the issues of dependency and disability reshaped Southern society.

Lastly, the Biomedical Library hosted a blood drive in partnership with LifeSouth Blood Centers in Mobile. Twenty donors registered for the successful event.

Red & Blue Days

The FAU Libraries organized a weeklong "<u>Amazing Race</u>" scavenger hunt from August 26 – Sept 2, during which it also hosted its second Open House for the FAU community on August 31, 2023. Both events were held in conjunction with the University's <u>Red and Blue Weeks</u>. External Relations promoted the event using "swag" giveaways to encourage involvement of participants in the Amazing Race Scavenger Hunt as well as those passing by individual tables. The event utilized the same <u>Goosechase</u> platform as last year. FAU Libraries had 182 participants with over 1,515 submissions at the conclusion of the Amazing Race, with 58 submissions for the Medical Library mission during the Open House.

Medical librarians Michelle Keba Knecht and Tiffany Follin connected with approximately 65 students and FAU staff during the event. The fun and informal setting continued to be a wonderful way to switch up the daily routine and interact with students beyond the College of Medicine. The librarians changed certain elements from last year's event based on qualitative feedback and department analysis. The scavenger hunt utilized the same question (How many parts are in the model heart? Answer: 8), and the new "swag" matched the event's theme with a stress ball in the shape of a stylized heart featuring the FAU Libraries logo. The model heart was a bit more fragile this year, which played into the lively interactions with students who were promptly given a de-stress heart to utilize during their upcoming semester. Students widely varied in majors, but pre-med students were identified and received a brief explanation on how to access the MCAT prep model available via *PrepSTEP for Colleges and Universities*.

The FAU Interprofessional Book Club brings together voices from the College of Medicine, the College of Nursing, and the School of Social Work, along with any student, staff, or faculty with an interest in healthcare topics. Participation in the book club also fosters critical communication skills that reflect the Core Competencies of the Interprofessional Education Collaborative (IPEC): Values and Ethics, Roles and Responsibilities, Communications, and Teams and Teamwork. Allie Brosh's Hyperbole and a Half: Unfortunate Situations, Flawed Coping Mechanisms, Mayhem, and Other Things was well received by attendees, who read <u>Depression Part 1</u> and <u>Depression</u> <u>Part 2</u> for the discussion. The next meeting will be held in February and will highlight a graphic novel for National Cancer Prevention Month.





For the final event, the Greenblatt Library hosted a Student Food & Fun Fair featuring lawn games, therapy dogs, and Augusta University's mascot, Augustus. WHSC Library Celebrates its 100-year Anniversary

The WHSC Library continues to celebrate the 100-year anniversary of the Emory University Medical Library. Founded as the Abner Wellborn Calhoun Medical Library in 1923 to support the Emory University School of Medicine, the library first opened its doors in January 1924. The WHSC Library now supports the university's schools of medicine, nursing, and public health, in addition to the graduate school division of biological and biomedical sciences. WHSC Library also supports the Emory Healthcare System and numerous Atlanta-based research centers, such as the Emory National Primate Research Center and the Georgia Clinical and Translational Sciences Alliance.

Two recent events highlighted the anniversary theme Building on a Legacy: Soaring to New Heights. On September 14 Dr. Patty Brennan spoke in her last public appearance as Director of the National Library of Medicine. Her talk, "Real Libraries for a Future Powered by Artificial Intelligence," highlighted the important role of libraries in the future and the impact of AI. Following her keynote address, a panel discussion on "Impactful Collaborations," showcased librarian impacts on university programs, missions, and outcomes. On October 24 the library highlighted its past as part of the 20th Annual J. Willis Hurst History of Medicine Symposium. Matt Miller, WHSC Library Collections Specialist, showcased the landmark works in the history of anatomy available through our historical print collections, in addition to a first edition copy of Andreas Vesalius *De Humani Corporis Fabrica Libri Septem* (1543). WHSC Library Archivist Ashley Stevens presented highlights from the J. Willis Hurst Papers, including correspondence with then-President Lyndon B. Johnson and First Lady Lady Bird Johnson, to whom he served as personal physician. WHSC Library Research Informationist Kim Powell presented on the legacies of the library's five directors since 1923. Each of the directors were strong female leaders who not only directed the library but left a lasting impact on the profession of medical librarianship. Library director (service years 1984-2000), Carol Burns, AHIP, FMLA. Burns spoke on the library collaboration with the Atlanta-Tbilisi Health Partnership Program to establish a national medical library in the country of Georgia.

Throughout the year, the <u>Rigor and Reproducibility Seminar Series</u> has added to the anniversary celebration events by hosting several timely talks on current events. On October 5 WHSC Library Research Informationist **Jeremy Kupsco**, hosted Dr. Judy Gichoya on a talk, "Hidden in Plain Sight: Harnessing Al's Ability for Population Health from Medical Images." 




Exam Week Program - Brain Power Hours

FIRST-TIME ATTENDEE REPORT APHA

In November, I received a Sewell Stipend to attend the American Public Health Association (APHA) Annual Meeting in Atlanta, GA. When I joined Emory University as a Public Health Informationist in March, my health sciences librarianship experience was focused on the needs of medical school learners and researchers, not public health. In fact, it was hard for me to conceptualize what the work in public health looks like outside of academia—it's such a broad and interdisciplinary field. Attending the APHA conference provided a great opportunity for me to learn more about the depth and breadth of the work in public health, from health surveys to climate justice and everything in between.

The Conference: I love attending conferences for the energy—the energy of the attendees, the presenters, the calls to action — all of it was present in full force at APHA. I attended memorable sessions on indigenous health, climate and environmental justice, women's and maternal health, and much more.

The overarching theme that echoed throughout this year's conference, from the opening session onward, was this: the solution to the public health crisis in the United States isn't a healthcare solution, it's a systemic problem that is the job of multiple agencies and disciplines to fix. I left the conference exhausted, but also energized to return to my work with the school of public health at Emory with a better understanding of the field.

Connections: A cohort of health sciences librarians received a stipend to attend the conference, and we met virtually a few times before the conference and in person once we were there. I'm so glad to have met my fellow public health librarians, many of whom are in Southern Chapter! As part of the requirements for receiving the stipend, I worked with a public health faculty member at my institution to serve as my mentor for the conference. This has led to a great faculty connection, and I hope to partner with my mentor on teaching and learning in the coming semesters.

Sewell Stipend: Attending the conference was a great experience and a valuable crash course on the work of public health. If you work with a public health audience, I'd recommend attending if you can. The Sewell Stipend is awarded to a cohort of librarians each year through a competitive application process. They usually put a call out through the Public Health / Health Administration Caucus and other MLA caucuses and groups during the summer, so keep an eye out. JOCELYN RANKIN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP REPORT

As a recipient of the Jocelyn Rankin Memorial Scholarship, I had the opportunity to attend the December 2023 offering of the University of Michigan's Systematic Reviews Opportunities for Librarians Workshop. The Taubman Health Sciences Library offers workshops in the winter and spring to information professionals who want to advance the skills essential to evidence synthesis projects. Instructors offered content asynchronously and synchronously during three Zoom training sessions. The workshop walked attendees through the essential duties of a librarian involved in systematic reviews, including project management, comprehensive searching, protocol development and more.

The search strategy project was most impactful, in that participants developed systematic searches from a sample topic. We each then received individual feedback and opportunities to discuss our final search with an instructor. Although part of the session was asynchronous, I developed a sense of camaraderie with other participants through forum posts where we shared our experiences learning the workshop content. The synchronous workshops also included lively discussions and hands-on activities where we could practice what we learned. The in-person sessions culminated in creating an action plan where we articulated how to take what we had learned and put it into action at our institutions. I plan to seek out review teams to gauge their willingness to have me participate in projects and to practice my searching skills using the University of Michigan's practice search sets. I am grateful for Southern Chapter's financial support of my endeavors, and I enthusiastically encourage SCMLA members to take advantage of this workshop.



MAKING LIBRARY CONNECTIONS IN SPAIN


ADVENTURES IN OPEN-ACCESS BOOK PUBLISHING: THE FINAL CHAPTER

Susan Epstein, MSLS, AHIP, Charlotte Edwards Maguire Medical Library, Florida State University, has co-authored a chapter for an edited, open-access textbook. *Cognitive Information Processing: Career Theory, Research, and Practice* has been published by Florida State Open Publishing.

Susan's chapter is about career resource collections and emphasizes general library best practices. It is based on her work experience at the Maguire Medical Library. Because the MML is a special library in an academic parent organization, the chapter should be helpful to resource managers from all types of libraries that support any specialized type of education, research, and practice.

Susan reports that there have been several lessons learned from this adventure:

- Edited books with many contributors can take a very long time to publish. This book took at least 1.5 years.
- Being lead author of a chapter requires vision, patience, mentoring, and communication/editing skills.
- Writing always takes more time than expected, because it includes research, decision-making, organizing, re-organizing, and structuring paragraphs with topic/related sentences.
- Maintaining connections with former colleagues can present wonderful opportunities for collaboration.
- Working with a former job-share partner and former boss can be a lot of fun!
